

LAT 2231 Course Outline

Course Listing: LAT 2231 Intermediate Latin I (3-3).

Catalogue Description: Introduction to the Latin language with emphasis on pronunciation, basic vocabulary, fundamentals of grammar, and graded readings.

Prerequisites: None.

Schedule: Fall Semester.

Fees: None.

Required Textbooks and Materials:

Stephanie Pope, et al. *Cambridge Latin Course: Unit 3*. North American 4th edition. Cambridge University Press, 2002.

Course Objectives: LAT 1131, 1132, 2231, and 2232 comprise a two-year sequence of courses which develops progressively the student's ability to read the Latin language and appreciate Latin literature. In LAT 1131, students complete Unit 3 of the *Cambridge Latin Course*. Additionally, they are guided through a number of authentic passages from Latin authors.

Course Content: Stages 21-34 of the *CLC*.

Course Requirements: Course activities include lectures, class discussion, written and oral translation, assigned readings, computer and internet programs, and the preparation of study and review materials. Students who attend class regularly and complete assignments on time usually experience little difficulty with the course material, while those who are less regular in their attendance generally experience considerable difficulty. Students who cannot commit to daily class attendance and completion of assignments would therefore do well to enroll in another course.

Procedures for Assessment of Student Achievement:

The student takes four tests on Unit 3 of the *CLC*.

Attendance is taken each day, beginning with the first class period after the last day to add a class. Upon the seventh absence, the final grade is lowered by one letter regardless of the final average. No distinction is made between excused and unexcused absences.

Grading Policy: A = 100-90; B = 89-80; C = 79-70; D = 69-60; F = 59-0.

Policy on Cheating: The penalty for cheating is failure of the course.

Americans with Disabilities Act: Any student whose disabilities fall within the ADA must inform the instructor at the beginning of the term of any special needs or equipment necessary to accomplish the requirements of the course.
